An important life lesson is punctuality and we insist that all pupils are in lessons on time. This is a habit which will hold them in good stead throughout their life. Many thanks to parents for your support in getting pupils to school on time. The number of pupils reporting late to school has fallen significantly with your help. However, there are a significant number of roadworks which have just begun or are scheduled to start soon, so may I suggest setting off a little earlier to avoid the congestion that we shall all experience in the coming weeks.

It has been a difficult time for pupils studying for external examinations, and much of their preparation over the last two years has been affected by the impact of COVID. There is no doubt that pupils learn best in school, supported by their teachers. Pupils in year 11 will remain in school until 24th June, and in between their examinations they will attend their classes to engage in revision with their teachers or attend intervention classes and other strategies aimed at maximising their achievements this summer. Please note that all examination pupils, in year 11 and the sixth form, must be available for the examination board contingency day on 29th June. After this date, no public examinations will be held.

My parent's clinic continues each Thursday morning, from 9am to 10.30am and no appointment is necessary.

Message from Vice Principal – Mr Senior

Firstly, can I say what a pleasure it has been over the last few weeks at Morecambe Bay Academy, I have met many fantastic young people who each day demonstrate just how hardworking and ambitious they are, but above all else have shown spirit and respect in equal measure.

Ultimately, for them to be successful both now and later in life, they need to make academic progress each day so that they gain good qualifications, whilst developing excellent personal skills and above all else live by a good set of values. If we, the academy staff, and home can work together to deliver this they will be able to go on to live a happy, healthy and prosperous life whilst contributing positively to the lives of others.

To that aim we have made some tweaks to school life which have helped ensure students arrive to lesson on time, that learning begins promptly and that students give 100% attention when the teacher speaks-ask them about "STAR". These modifications are having a real impact on the climate of the academy and crucially the learning going on in classrooms.

However, our job is not to just teach them in the classroom, we must also take steps so that students feel safe, secure and happy in school whilst being prepared for life after school. Uniform is a key part of this work:

- If all students dress in uniform:
 - They all feel equal, no one is left out as they do not have the latest pair of Nike trainers etc.
 - We are able to identify our students as our students which ensures they are safe.
 - If we teach them to dress not only in correct uniform but with pride it:
 - Gives them a sense of belonging that builds the culture of school which in turn has a positive impact on both their well-being and academic progress.
 - Prepares them for life, no matter if you attend a social function or work place there is a
 dress codes, at a wedding we dress formally in suits, dresses and even hats, whilst on
 a night out we dress smartly but in a more casually manner, a plumber must wear a
 hard hat and footwear with steel toe caps, a surgeon must be dressed in their clean
 surgical gown, gloves, hat and mask, the list goes on.

To that end we must teach students the importance of uniform and expect them to wear it. Full details of our uniform can be accessed via the website using the link below. However please may I stress the following:

- The only jewellery permitted is one pair of plain silver or gold-coloured studs worn in the lower ear lobe. No facial piercings are allowed.
- Pupils are allowed to wear mascara, concealer, and foundation this must be subtle*. Pupils
 are not allowed fake eyelashes/eyelash extensions, false or acrylic nails or wear coloured nail
 varnish.
- That blazer sleeves and skirts should not be rolled up. In situations where skirts are too big on the waist they should be taken in either permanently or if necessary through the use of a hair temporarily with a safety pin, hair band or clip.


English Department - Primary Visit




Last Friday, Mrs Davies from the English Department has once again visited Ryelands Primary School to deliver a poetry workshop.


