# Dear Parent/Carer,

Welcome to our fortnightly roundup where we share news from around the academy.

Open Evening was a busy affair, when pupils helped staff to show off the school to prospective parents. We were delighted by the number of families who came around to look at the school and see what we do. May I thank all pupils who helped do tours, speak to prospective families and generally helped to create such an amazing and positive atmosphere. And may I thank the parents of those pupils for bringing them and collecting them that evening. Thank you for your support.

We have been made aware of the unintended consequence of extending the school day in response to the direction from the Secretary for Education. This has meant that some pupils are having difficulty getting service buses home. We have spoken to colleagues at Stagecoach about this. Whilst they cannot amend the buses timetable, they will be providing comprehensive information about alternative buses and times. We will circulate this information as soon as we receive it. Additionally, pupils are welcome to stay in school to compete homework here where it is warm and dry, rather than waiting at the bus stop for the next bus. This has the added advantage of meaning less homework to do at home too.

We have many toilets in school and pupils should use these toilets before school, at breaktime and lunchtime and after school. Toilets are supervised at these times. However, pupils are not permitted to use the toilet during lesson time unless they have a medical condition. Where pupils have a medical condition, we give them a toilet card with a chip embedded so that they can unlock a toilet for them to use in lesson time. From Monday 10<sup>th</sup> October, teachers will not permit pupils to leave the classroom to use the toilet unless they have a toilet pass. If your child has a medical condition which may necessitate a toilet pass, please ensure you have emailed your child's Head of Year with a copy of the medical diagnosis so that we can ensure they have a pass in place before the 10<sup>th</sup> October.

I have been contacted about concerns around the morning drop off of pupils on Dallam Avenue. These concerns have been raised with the police and city council. The concerns are around parents parking on double yellow lines to drop off pupils which partially obstructs the road and also pupils crossing the road without looking out for on-coming vehicles. The concerns have been raised because there is a potential for an accident which we all would wish to avoid. Please can you consider where you drop off your child in the morning and reinforce good road safety habits with your child.
