<u>Task 2:</u> Research at least 3 of the texts mentioned above. Create a fact-file for each text.

Include information such as information about the plot, the writer, the time the text was written and the time it was set, key aspects of context and any criticism of the text.

<u>Task 3:</u> Read the poem below by Tony Harrison and annotate the poem (like you have done with your GCSE poetry). Which key themes and ideas are emerging?
